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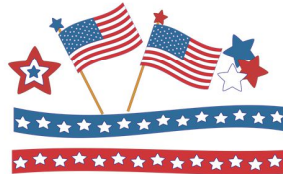

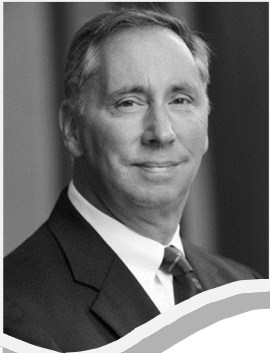

BILL WHALEN

A native of Washington, D.C., Bill Whalen was steeped in politics before relocating to California. From 1985 to 1991, he was a political correspondent for *Insight Magazine*, the

national newsweekly and sister publication of the *Washington Times*, where he was honored for his profiles and analyses of candidates, campaigns, Congress, and the White House. Whalen appeared frequently on C-SPAN, National Public Radio, and CNBC. The 1992 Media Guide said Whalen is one of its “top ten” political reporters stating, “*The New York Times* could trade six of its political writers for Whalen and still get a bargain.”

Since 1999 Bill Whalen has been a fellow with the Hoover Institute, and writes and comments on campaigns, elections and governance with an emphasis on California and America’s political landscapes. He is a columnist for the *Sacramento Bee* newspaper and also writes on politics and current events for Forbes.com. His commentary can also be seen on the opinion pages of the *Wall Street Journal*, Real Clear Politics, *Los Angeles Times* and the Fox News’ website. Whalen has served as a media consultant for California political hopefuls and aspiring policy leaders. His past clients have included former Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, former congressman Tom Campbell, and former Los Angeles mayor Richard J. Riordan. Prior to joining the Hoover Institution, Whalen served as chief speechwriter and director of public affairs for former California governor Pete Wilson. In that capacity, he was responsible for the governor’s annual State of the State address as well as other major policy addresses.

In addition to his time in Washington as a political journalist, Whalen served as a speechwriter for the Bush-Quayle re-election campaign and was a senior associate with the public relations firm Robinson-Like/Sawyer-Miller, offering media and political advice for domestic and foreign clientele.

Whalen currently resides in Palo Alto, California.

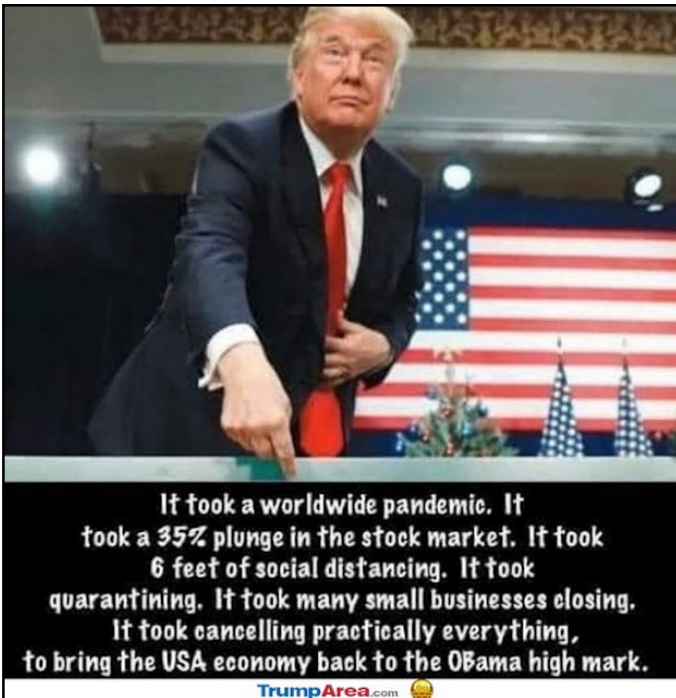
Announcing IV-CB Republican Women New Website

My Fellow Republican Women:

I hope you and those you care about are keeping safe and healthy during this crisis. As we focus (and rightly so) on how the coronavirus is tearing the social and economic fabric of our communities, it can be easy to forget that other concerns are vital and ongoing.

One essential concern —in good times and bad — is conducting free and fair elections. In Nevada, voting in the 2020 primary will largely be through mail-in ballots because of the pandemic; that's also going to be the case in jurisdictions across the country.

Mail-in ballots, as a matter of course, invite concerns about privacy and improper influence in the absence of the seclusion of the voting booth. Those concerns only increase in 2020 with the huge increase in mail-in ballots.

Also, given the disruption to government services caused by the coronavirus, it's important to emphasize that the enormous number of mail-in ballots must be returned safely, stored properly, and counted efficiently and securely.

Even with most voting done through mail-in ballots in the 2020 primary, at least one in-person polling place will be allowed in each Nevada County to accommodate a new law that allows people to register and vote on the same day. In Washoe County that location will be the office of the Voter Registrar at 1001 E. Ninth Street in Reno Building A, 1st floor.

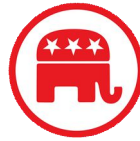
Same-day registration incorporates its own set of issues. For those who have not registered they may go to the Ninth Street office and register and vote either during the early-voting period or on election day. Some concerns about same-day registration include - Can identity be adequately verified on the spot? Will it be left to county officials to determine identity in "close calls?" What about voter safety at the polling place in each county? Will surfaces have to be sanitized between each voter? Will even a slight inconsistency in same-day registration and voting be grounds for legal action after an election?

I don't have all the answers, but as a Washoe County Commissioner who represents thousands of Nevadans, it's my responsibility to raise the issues and ask the questions I've discussed above.

I wish you all the best during this crisis and look forward to a time when we can all get together again. As always, please contact me with any questions or concerns.

SPEAKING FOR NEVADA

Save Lives: Get Nevada Back to Work

The coronavirus outbreak has unleashed unimaginable fear and heartbreak upon our Country and the world. At the beginning of this crisis, each of us worried that either we or those close to us would get sick. That concern remains today, and justifiably so. No one wants to suffer or see our loved ones suffer.

That concern also includes not wanting to endure the financial pain this virus has caused for so many of our citizens and workers, from the widespread, forced shutdown of businesses deemed non-essential by governments. The hardship this has caused already is staggering – and will become more so, particularly in Nevada, if our economy doesn't open up soon.

In 1933 at the worst point of the Great Depression, America's national unemployment rate peaked at 24.9 percent. More recently, it reached 10 percent during the Great Recession in 2009, with Nevada's economy hit especially hard; the Silver State endured the worst unemployment, bankruptcy and home-foreclosure crises in the nation. Our unemployment rate hit 14.9 percent.

Yet as awful as the Great Recession was, the consequences of our current economic shutdown threaten to be far worse. Economists estimate our national unemployment rate could be between 32 and 41 percent. This would not only dwarf what we saw during the Great Recession, but would significantly exceed even the Great Depression figure. Nevada's tourism-driven economy

would once again suffer the most. Indeed, we are already on our way down that road. In the past month, Nevada has seen more than 300,000 new unemployment claims, and approximately 20 percent of Nevada's workers have lost their jobs. This data already substantially exceeds the national unemployment rate.

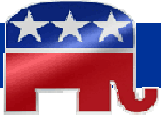
Often overlooked is the array of other maladies always accompanying financial strife. Our job-loss numbers are not merely statistics; they are tragedies — individual, personal tragedies — of lives damaged, sometimes ruined. During times of chronic unemployment, people suffer in ways beyond, though largely driven by, their financial difficulties. We see increases in crime, substance abuse, domestic violence, depression, even suicide.

And we must be mindful of this truth: It is the low-income individuals among us, already struggling financially and least able to sustain further hardship, who suffer disproportionately. CEOs and high-level executives aren't the ones on the phone all day, on hold, waiting for somebody from the Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation to take their call and hear their claim. It's the workers who are the backbone of our economy. The human toll resulting from our self-imposed financial collapse is not theoretical; it can and will be every bit as tragic as that caused by a public-health threat.

Those who are setting public policy in the face of this crisis must reject the false, binary choice that many opinion-shapers are trying to present. This is not a matter of weighing lives against our economy. We're weighing lives against lives. Acting otherwise, and taking an unbalanced, all-or-nothing approach may be the politically expedient road, but it's not what this situation demands. A purely maximalist approach is not statesmanship — and it will not only cost Nevada financially, it will cost us more lives.

It is time for Nevada to begin the process of re-opening our economy. The latest data from the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation indicate our state has passed the peak of our death rate, and that our hospital-bed situation — a major area of concern since the beginning of this crisis — is under control, with 2,247 beds available and only 386 needed.

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SPEAKING FOR NEVADA

Re-opening our economy, of course, doesn't have to — and shouldn't — mean taking the same kind of all-or-nothing approach we see in the current shutdown. It should look more like a toggle than a light switch. As businesses open, we can still intervene and close things down if and when we see spikes in coronavirus cases in specific areas or communities.

Our elected leaders and public officials will continue to face difficult decisions during the process of re-opening, and they must meet the challenges ahead. But they won't be alone. Nevada's entertainment industry has long been a world leader in entrepreneurial dynamism and innovation, and as economic activity resumes, we can and should trust our business leaders and workers to lead us back to prosperity — responsibly and safely. They don't want to get sick, or see their co-workers and customers get sick, any more than the rest of us do. We should trust them to take the necessary pre-cautions within their own places of business to promote good public health, and to protect their fellow citizens as best they can. And we should trust small businesses all across

Nevada to exercise the same good judgment.

We cannot and must not compound this tremendous public-health crisis by pursuing a course that does not adequately consider the personal tragedies our policies are causing for unprecedented numbers of our fellow citizens.

It's time for Nevada to get back to work.

Women Who Made a Difference During the Months of May and June (1810 to 1983) Around the World and in America

– MAY –

May 23, 1810 – Journalist Margaret Fuller (1810-1850) was born in Cambridgeport, Massachusetts. She became the first American woman to serve as a foreign correspondent, reporting for the *New York Tribune*. Her book, *Women in the Nineteenth Century*, published in 1845, is considered the first feminist statement by an American writer, and brought her international acclaim. Sailing from Italy to the United States in 1850, she died, along with her husband and infant son, in a shipwreck off Fire Island, New York.

May 12, 1820 – British nurse and public health activist Florence Nightingale (1820-1910) was born in Florence, Italy. She volunteered to aid

British troops in Turkey where she improved hospital sanitary conditions and greatly reduced the death rate for wounded and sick soldiers. She received worldwide acclaim for her unselfish devotion to nursing, contributed to the development of

modern nursing procedures, and emphasized the dignity of nursing as a profession for women.

May 23, 1846 – The first American female attorney Arabella Mansfield (1846-1911) was born near Burlington, Iowa (as Belle Aurelia Babb). She was certified in 1869 as an attorney and admitted to the Iowa bar, but never practiced law. Instead she chose a career as a college educator and administrator. She was also instrumental in the founding of the Iowa Suffrage Society in 1870.

May 21, 1881 -

The American Red Cross was founded by Clara Barton. The organization today provides volunteer disaster relief in the United States and abroad. Community services include collecting and distributing donated blood, and teaching health and safety classes.



May 4th, 1898 – Golda Meir (1898-1978) was born in Kiev, Russia. She was one of the founders of the modern state of Israel and served as prime minister from 1969 to 1974.

May 20, 1932 –

Amelia Earhart became the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic. She departed Newfoundland, Canada, at 7 p.m. and landed near Londonderry, Ireland, completing



a 2,026-mile flight in about 13 hours. Five years later, along with her navigator Fred Noonan, she disappeared while trying to fly her twin-engine plane around the equator.

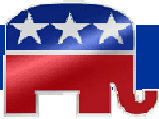
May 14, 1942 – During World War II, an Act of Congress allowed women to enlist for noncombat duties in the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC), the Women Appointed for Voluntary Emergency Service (WAVES), Women's Auxiliary Ferrying Squadron (WAFS), and Semper Paratus Always Ready Service

(SPARS), the Women's Reserve of the Marine Corp.

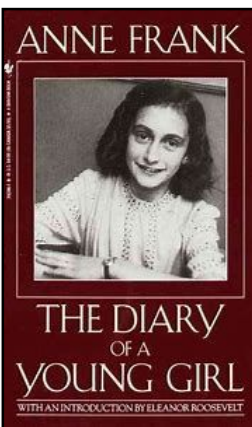
June 6, 1872 – Pioneering feminist Susan B. Anthony was fined for voting in a presidential election at Rochester, New York.



After voting rights had been granted to African

American males by the 15th Amendment, she attempted to extend the same rights to women. She led a group of women that voted illegally, to test their status as citizens. She was arrested, tried and sentenced to pay \$100, which she refused. Following her death in 1906 after five decades of tireless work, the Democratic and Republican parties both endorsed women's right to vote. In August of 1920, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was finally ratified, allowing women to vote.

June 12, 1929 – Anne Frank (1929-1945) was born in Frankfurt, Germany. She is perhaps the best known victim of the Nazi Holocaust. Anne and her family moved from Germany to Amsterdam to flee Nazi persecution and went into hiding in a small attic after Holland was invaded by Nazis. Anne, a girl on the verge of womanhood, was unable to go outside for any reason. In 1942, she began a diary to cope with the boredom, fear, annoyances, and loneliness of captivity.



Her family's hiding place was eventually discovered and Anne and her family were deported to Nazi concentration camps. She contracted typhus and died at Bergen-Belsen in 1945. After the war, her father published her diary, which inspired the

world, revealing a young woman who had managed to remain hopeful, despite it all.

June 18, 1983 – Dr. Sally Ride, a 32-year-old physicist and pilot, became the first American woman in space, beginning a six-day mission aboard the space shuttle Challenger, launched from Cape Canaveral, Florida.

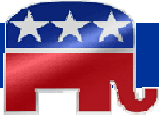
The modern holiday of Mother's Day was first celebrated in 1908, when Anna Jarvis held a

memorial for her mother at Saint Andrew's Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia. Saint Andrew's Methodist Church now holds the International Mother's Day Shrine.

Her campaign to make Mother's Day a recognized holiday in the United States began in 1905, the year her mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, died. Ann Jarvis had been a peace activist who cared for wounded soldiers on both sides of the American Civil War, and created Mother's Day Work Clubs to address public health issues. Anna Jarvis wanted to honor her mother by continuing the work she started and to set aside a day to honor all mothers because she believed a mother is "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world."

In 1908, the U.S. Congress rejected a proposal to make Mother's Day an official holiday, joking that they would also have to proclaim a "Mother-in-law's Day." However, owing to the efforts of Anna Jarvis, by 1911 all U.S. states observed the holiday with some of them officially recognizing Mother's Day in 1910 as a local holiday – the first being West Virginia, Jarvis' home state.

In 1914, Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation designating Mother's Day, held on the second Sunday in May, as a national holiday to honor mothers.
