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
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

Dear Members,

For months, we at *Morning in Nevada PAC* have been leading the fight against the left's dangerous push for all-mail voting here in Nevada.

Unfortunately, back in the spring, Nevada Secretary of State Barbara Cegavske converted Nevada's primary elections to all-mail voting, which exposed our elections to the risk of widespread fraud. It was a misguided decision, but thankfully, thousands of you joined us in speaking up, making it clear that you don't want all-mail voting in our state. It's clear today that your voice is being heard, as it appears Secretary Cegavske will not repeat her mistake for the General Election.

The Las Vegas Review-Journal <u>reports</u> that, "Nevada Secretary of State Barbara Cegavske said the state plans to return to a traditional, in-person election format for the Nov. 3 general election."

This is a big victory, but we are not out of the woods yet. Local officials in Clark County, which has Nevada's largest number of voters, continue to push for mail-in voting for the General Election, but the plan would need to be approved by the Secretary of State — who has the unilateral authority to reject this dangerous scheme.

We must keep the pressure on Secretary Cegavske. We're asking that you take just a few minutes of your time and call or email her office and demand she say "NO" to Clark County's plan. Nevada Secretary of State phone number is 775-684-5705, email: nvelect@sos.nv.gov.

Thank you for fighting alongside us — our efforts are paying off, and if we keep the pressure up, we can keep all-mail voting out of our state!

Follow the Money

Google Is Evil

The tech giant's monopoly is increasingly a major threat to free political speech. Recently there was a marked anniversary of



sorts, but it passed without a whisper. In 2019, Robert Epstein warned Congress about the very real threat Google poses to our republican form of government and how to deal with that threat. To which our elected representatives have responded by doing pretty much nothing.

Epstein, a Harvard-educated behavioral psychologist and the former editor-in-chief of *Psychology Today*, gave sworn Senate testimony that began, "I love America and democracy, and I am also not a conservative." Having established his left-leaning bona fides, he then offered evidence of what every fair-minded person who's ever done a politics-related Google search have long suspected: "Data I've collected since 2016 show that Google displays content to the American public that is biased in favor of one political party — a party I happen to like, but that's irrelevant. Democracy as originally conceived," he said, "cannot survive Big Tech as currently empowered."

Epstein went on to explain what he calls the Search Engine Manipulation Effect, or SEME, which measures how opinions (and votes) can be altered by search algorithms that favor one candidate or party over another. A month later, Epstein published a Bloomberg op-ed detailing the three biggest threats posed by Big Tech: (1) aggressive surveillance, (2) suppression of content, and (3) "the subtle *manipulation of the thinking and behavior of more than 2.5 billion people.*" Epstein also proposed a solution involving transparency and competition — two concepts that Big Tech avoids like Brussels sprouts.

More recently, lawmakers and U.S. Attorney General William Barr have been exploring a different solution — that of reevaluating Section 230 of the 1996 Communications Decency Act, which currently grants Big Tech protections against lawsuits aimed at the content on their platforms. Those "platforms" have in recent years

been behaving like progressive publishers, however, and they should no longer be able to hide behind Section 230. This is certainly true of Google, which, together with its YouTube subsidiary, controls a monopolistic share (more than 90 percent) of online searches.

"Unfortunately," Barr told Fox News's Maria Bartiromo on her Sunday television show, these tech platforms "started taking down viewpoints and started really being selective and, based on whether they agreed with the viewpoint or not, taking [those viewpoints] down. And that should make them a publisher."

The unwise have said that Google can't fool them. But Google doesn't have to fool anyone; it can simply fool the other guy. The 2016 presidential election, for example, was decided by fewer than 78,000 votes out of 136 million cast. Donald Trump won Michigan by 0.2 points, and Pennsylvania and Wisconsin both by 0.7 points. Thus, if Big Tech could've swayed the votes of just two late-deciders out of each thousand votes cast in Michigan, and just seven out of each thousand cast in Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, Hillary Clinton would be your president.

Daniel Hannan, a journalist and former member of the British Parliament, wrote about the "unholy alliance of big government and Big Tech," which evolved out of tech companies' desire to protect themselves from those who would tax and regulate them, while at the same time setting up a system that kept out new competitors. "Whose fault is all this?" Hannan asked. He answered, "I'm afraid it's yours. You allowed the Big Tech companies to get their hands on your data in the first place. You say you don't like it, but in practice, you don't really care." Indeed, every time you search with Google instead of, say, Bing or DuckDuckGo, you're supporting an information colossus that's working to undo everything you hold dear.

There was a time, up until just a few years ago, when Google lived and worked by the words, "Don't be evil," which was its unofficial motto. When it removed that language from its corporate code of conduct in 2015, we should've smelled a rat.

Tell all your friends: Google is evil.

love baseball. I've always loved baseball and have been "playing" since I could walk. Some of my earliest memories are playing catch with my dad. My goal growing up was always to play baseball at the collegiate level. Because of my hard work and determination, even with two elbow surgeries during high school, I have reached my goal! Another goal I had was to play college baseball at the highest level - Division 1 - and I achieved that too! I've been offered a roster spot to pitch for the University of the Pacific Baseball team in Stockton, California.

Baseball and other organized sports (soccer, basketball and tennis) has been a staple in my life and taught me to be a leader, work hard and keep reaching for what I want. Playing sports has taught me that life isn't always easy and that you have to work very hard to get what you want. I am a better student because of sports. Sports taught me confidence, teamwork, work ethic, discipline and time management.

Elementary and middle school were relatively easy and I earned nearly straight A's in all my classes. However, high school has been challenging for me. When entering high school, I had just received a prestigious award given by the staff of Incline Middle School - The Mountain Lion Award. My grades suffered and I felt peer pressure from my non-teammates which led me to hanging with the wrong people and making bad choices.



In my Junior year of high school, things changed for the better! I was able to again compete in sports, which gave me the confidence and maturity to ask for help with my school work and not be ashamed to do so. I was again with my teammates and my GPA rose, which in

turn gave me more confidence. I excelled at sports again and became the leader I had been previously. Even though I had another surgery which finally cured my elbow problem in the middle of my Junior year, I stayed the course and continued to thrive. I started to drive, got a summer job, worked hard and focused on my love of baseball and enjoyed a ton of good friends!

All of my hard work and determination to be a good student-athlete paid off. I am the team captain for all three of my varsity sports this year. Our basketball team went to State, and I was selected First Team All State and First Team All Conference. I feel I am back in control of my future. I've matured and am very much looking forward to what university life will bring. I've received a partial academic scholarship from University of the Pacific and was offered a roster spot on the baseball team: I am going to pitch for the Tigers! 1856 – The First Republican National Convention: **The Anti-Slavery Party**

he 1856 Republican National Convention was a presidential nominating convention that met from June 17 to June 19 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It was the first national convention in the history of the Republican Party, and was held to nominate the party's candidates for president and vice president in the 1856 election. The convention selected former Senator John C. Frémont of California for president and former Senator William L. Dayton of New Jersey for vice president. The convention also appointed the members of the newly-established Republican National Committee.

The Republican Party had been organized by opponents of the expansion of slavery in the territories following the passage of the 1854 Kansas-Nebraska Act. With William Seward, Salmon P. Chase, and Charles Sumner all taking their names out of consideration, Frémont entered the Republican convention as the front-runner for the presidential nomination. Frémont had previously been nominated by the North American Party, which consisted of antislavery members of the American Party who were unwilling to support the American Party candidate, Millard Fillmore. Though Associate Justice John McLean of Ohio had the backing of some delegates, Frémont clinched the presidential nomination on the first formal ballot of the Republican convention.

Dayton was nominated on the first formal vice presidential ballot, defeating former Congressman Abraham Lincoln of Illinois and several other candidates. The Republican ticket carried several Northern states in the general election, but the Democratic ticket of James Buchanan and John C. Breckinridge won the 1856 election.

Background

On June 19, 1855, a small gathering of like-minded individuals met in Washington, D.C. where they passed a resolution noting the recent abrogation of "all compromises, real or imaginary" by the opening of Kansas Territory and Nebraska Territory to the possible institution of slavery. These proclaimed themselves the "Republican Association of Washington, District of Columbia" and passed a simple four plank platform including the demand that "There should be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except for the punishment of crime, in any of the Territories of the

> United States." A number of state organizations were soon established along similar lines and the Republican Party was effectively born.

> On January 17, 1856, representatives of Republican Party organizations in Ohio, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Vermont, and Wisconsin - all Northern states in which slavery was prohibited – issued a joint call for an "informal Convention" to be held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, on February 22, 1856, in order to perfect the national organization and to call a formal, properly delegated national convention to nominate candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States for the forthcoming November 1856 election. The

gathering elected a governing National Executive Committee and passed various resolutions calling for the repeal of laws enabling slaveholding in free territories and "resistance by Constitutional means of Slavery in any Territory," defense of antislavery individuals in Kansas who were coming under physical attack, and a call to "resist and overthrow the present National Administration" of Franklin Pierce, "as it is identified with the progress of the Slave power to national supremacy."

The 22-member Republican National

Committee, which included one representative from each state attending the Pittsburgh Convention, met in plenary session on March 27, 1856, at the Willard Hotel in Washington,



DC, and issued a call for a formal presidential nominating convention. This was slated to begin on June 17, 1856, in Philadelphia. Each state organization was to be allocated six at-large delegates, plus three delegates for each congressional district.

Remembering Clyde A. Kowallis

Clyde A. Kowallis, born January 12, 1935 in Boise, Idaho - died June 23, 2020 in Palm Desert, California, at home, from acute myeloid leukemia.

lyde was born and raised in Boise and graduated from Boise High School in 1953. He was on the Golf Team and earned his letter in football. After high school he attended Boise Junior College. Clyde spent his childhood summers from age four to 14 on his maternal grandparents farm in Minden, Utah - not as a summer camper but as a farm worker to help his grandfather, as the other male relatives were serving in the war. In fact, Clyde attributed that time as a character building education.



After his father started the business of Kowallis & Richards (industrial hardware) in 1949, Clyde spent the rest of his business life working there. Other than for a stint in the Idaho Army National Guard, which covered a total of 10 years, he graduated from OCS and left the service in 1962 as a 1st Lieutenant.

Clyde married Carol Ann Crandall in 1955. They had two sons, Tracy and Terry. Clyde was a big supporter of the Boise State Broncos, having lifetime seats for all Boise State events and attended the Fiesta Bowls, Poinsettia Bowl and away games in Honolulu. Carol died in 2001.
